Monthly Walks from Evelyn Sharman

You may know that I recently stood down as a Parish Councillor for Holsworthy Hamlets. I am delighted to learn that a new Councillor has recently been appointed. Her name is Janine King. She has very kindly volunteered to take up the role of P3 coordinator so I know that our local Public Rights of Way in Holsworthy Hamlets are in good hands. I understand that Councillor King will not be continuing with the Inter Parish Walks so I know that I won't be treading on anybody's toes if I continue to organise monthly walks. I must stress that these are not under the umbrella of either a Parish Council or Devon County Council so if anyone wishes to join me, there is no insurance in place & they do so entirely at their own risk.

It was on this basis that a few people joined me on Monday 13th September. We met at the Village Hall in Clawton & enjoyed a circular walk of six miles. I am no whizz with technology so I calculated the distance in advance by using a piece of string, an OS map & a tape measure. It would appear that the old fashioned method worked a treat as two of my fellow walkers checked the distance with more modern means & confirmed that we had indeed covered a distance of six miles. The route took us past Forda Mill & across Affaland Moor. When we joined the North Tamerton - Pyworthy road, we turned right & then right again towards Leworthy. The lane took us past




Climate Change - you and your home

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
This month, continuing the theme of climate change, focussing on how we can find the energy efficiency of our homes, and what we can do about it.

A good starting point is to check out on line, the current energy efficiency of your home. This is its EPC rating and is freely available here: https://find-energy-certificate.digital.communities.gov.uk/. You can also compare your efficiency to others in the neighbourhood or look at the data for a potential purchase as the information is freely and publicly available. You are likely aware of the energy information available for when you purchase an electrical appliance, buildings have a similar rating from A+ down to G. Remember the rating you can see is based on the findings from when the assessment was undertaken and does not reflect any improvements since. If you want to sell or rent your house, you will need an up-to-date certificate.

Here is an example from a Coventry address, 346 Stoney Stanton Road. The post code or street will give you a list of properties and reports in the area, you just click on the one you are interested in to give more information and access the report. It will also give you a visual rating. As well as an energy rating, if you scroll down the page, you come across a list of the features the report has considered, and that features rating (very good to poor). This list gives you a good indication of areas for improvement. Scroll down further, and there is a table showing opportunities to improve, predicted cost and savings. This section can be a bit vague – for example this house report mentions that 'roofing' is classed as very poor (no insulation) – but does not recommend insulation, which would be the best and simplest investment to undertake. To determine the best opportunities for your home, I would recommend using the 'simple energy advice' site in the next section.

Key improvements to consider

The key thing to do is understand the current 'efficiency status' of your home and the basic high impact improvements you can make. So, for example, do you have wall cavities, are they filled and when? what level of insulation is in your loft? How is your home and water heated and lit. I would recommend working through the 'your home' sections in the following:

For example, for an unheated loft, the insulation should be more than 200mm – just adding another layer will make a big difference. But the potential improvements discussed on this site are much wider, with good detail. Remember, improvements can increase comfort as well as saving you money.

Other energy (and money) saving tips

There are many low / no cost changes you can make, here is a reminder of just a few! Fit low energy / LED bulbs and lighting. Costs of these items have plummeted, and LEDs use a tiny fraction of the energy of traditional incandescent bulbs. Switching off devices rather than leaving in standby – TVs and desktop computers tend to get left on or in standby for 'convenience'. Take a Shower instead of a bath. This will give you a double saving if you are on a meter. Use the wind to dry clothing – tumble dryers use a <u>lot</u> of energy. Pop on a jumper and turn down the thermostat. Also, when buying new appliances, make their energy efficiency a key factor in your purchase. Remember you will be stuck with its energy use for a long time.

Funding improvements to your home

Grants and loans is a very fast-moving area, especially with Climate Change starting to rise up the political agenda. You can do a simple post code check here:

https://www.simpleenergyadvice.org.uk/grants which should give you all current funding opportunities. It is also worth checking with your energy provider, they often have their own schemes you can benefit from.

Holsworthy Walk and Talk from Gill Aston

Last month we revisited Claw Moor Plantation which is situated between Hollacombe and Brandis Corner at the side of the A3079. For some reason we haven't walked there for several years but it is definitely worth a visit, although parking can be tricky. Claw Moor is 134.02 ha (331.16 acres) in size with a circular hard track about 1.5 miles around which serves the forestry vehicles and makes for easy walking. There is a large deer population but, sadly, we didn't see any, and a very interesting lake. Although not large the lake is man-made and has an unusual 'drain' within it to regulate the water levels, the overflow of which runs away underneath the track. Apparently the lake water is used by the emergency services should there be a fire within the plantation.

It was very peaceful standing at the lakeside admiring the abundant wildlife and trying to identify the birds who were happily swimming and feeding in the sunshine. Getting out and about with our Group gives us an opportunity to find and enjoy these peaceful gems which are so close to home and even on the side of a busy road.
