Message from the Chair of Clawton Parish Council, Paul Grafton

The last edition of the Clarion was printed just as the lockdown restrictions were announced so, apart from some in Southcott Garage and a few Irene normally posts, all other copies were put in the bus shelter opposite the former village shop. Very few seem to have been taken but hopefully many have been able to pick it up from our village website www.clawton.org.uk. The remaining copies will be left in the bus shelter for a couple of weeks.

We have decided to post this edition of the Clarion to avoid our distributors having to visit your house.

The Parish Council is responsible for disaster planning for the village – our plan covers a major epidemic and is published on the website. The council's role is to communicate and co-ordinate. We know of at least two families in the village who seem to have contracted the virus and two people who have been hospitalised, one of whom thankfully we know is recovered and back home. It would be helpful if anyone who is showing symptoms – whether needing to be hospitalised or not – could let Paul Grafton know so that the Parish Council has some idea of what is the situation in the village. No names will be passed on to anyone without express permission. We are particularly anxious to know of anyone living alone who might need our support if they contract the virus.



Guess the parish through a walk by Evelyn Sharman (answer after the poem)

My route starts at Stanbury Cross. It takes me down a very pretty lane which does not have a name & is marked as unclassified on the map. In recent weeks it has been so pretty with primroses. They have definitely brightened up my day. Now that they are starting to fade, they are quickly being replaced by a mass of other flowers including celandines, blue bells, pink campions & violets. I have to admit that there are lots of other much smaller flowers in the hedgerow that I haven't identified. Silly really because I have had plenty of time on my hands to do so!! At the bottom of the hill, a stream passes under the road at what I believe is known locally as Lamerton Bridge. I have learned that it's best not to mention the name Lamerton when giving directions for fear that any visitors go heading in the direction of Tavistock. Postcodes are a wonderful thing! The lane then goes up hill with Devon banks on both sides which offer pedestrians & cyclists some protection from the prevailing south westerly wind. Along my route there is an unadopted road/track on my left which leads down to a collection of six properties. Until a couple of years ago, there were only five properties. One of the original stone buildings that was possibly associated with the Holsworthy branch of the Bude canal has been converted into a private residence. Two of the original stone piers have been kept as relics from the past. Looking to the right from the road, I can see house boats through the trees. They won't be visible for much longer once the leaves adorn the trees. They provide accommodation for anybody looking for a tranquil holiday in close proximity to wildlife. It's a real haven for water birds. From this point, it's a steady uphill climb on a much straighter bit of road for about half a mile. Towards the top, there has been a magnificent Magnolia tree in blossom in a property adjacent to the road. I could smell the scent from the verge. Before long there will be a carpet of petals making it look as though it has been snowing. My route ends at Blagdonmoor Cross having covered a distance of approximately two miles.

Answer to walk parish – Holsworthy Hamlets

A Thought from Rev Stephen

Thomas is someone with whom I feel a great deal of empathy – not least because he is often misunderstood. People often describe him as "Thomas the Doubter" – and mean this in negative terms. He was not present when Jesus first appears to the ten disciples, and he got 'ragged' for missing out on the amazing experience of seeing their hero alive again in the flesh. I think Thomas was rather grumpy about their critical attitude, and quite understandably said that he would not believe what they were saying unless he could also see Jesus physically alive 'in the flesh'. Jesus knew, in his spirit, that Thomas was upset and wanted to meet him too – which is why he so graciously reappeared a week later in the very same venue. Thomas was invited by Jesus to touch his blood-stained wounds, and then cried out those immortal words: "My Lord and my God!" St John records this acclamation as the climatic confession of his Gospel – above and beyond any other disciple. It is clear to me that we are invited to make an identical response to the wonderful story of Jesus' resurrection – to believe for ourselves that Jesus is our Lord and Saviour too.

Thus Thomas sets before us a brilliant example of how we can bring our questions, doubts and uncertainties to God, in a spirit of enquiry, rather than cynicism. God welcomes open and honest questioning about the things that trouble us in life – not least the havoc being wrought through the ravages of Covid19. I suggest that like Thomas, you don't bottle up your upset at the state of our world in this pandemic, but bring your struggles of faith to God, and then seek for some answers. These will come as you spend time in deepening your encounter with Jesus, who loves you and really does seek your welfare. He will grant to you and those you love life-giving spiritual energy for these tough days.

I'll end with part of a Sonnet for Thomas, by Malcolm Guite:

"We do not know how can we know the way? Courageous master of the awkward question, You spoke the words the others dared not say And cut through their evasion and abstraction. Because he loved your awkward counterpoint, The Word has heard and granted you your wish. O place my hands with yours, help me divine The wounded God whose wounds are healing mine."
